Nature Highlights: Feral Hog By: Erin Richardson

Happy New Year! 2019 is the year of the pig, so it's fitting that our nature highlight is on the Feral Hog (*Sus scrofa*). Feral hogs are present in all 64 parishes in Louisiana and are considered to be a nuisance invasive species. These highly-adaptable omnivores have vast negative impacts; outcompeting native wildlife for resources, damaging agricultural crops, and uprooting planted and naturally regenerated conifers and hardwood seedlings. There are several control methods in place to help cull the feral hog populations including a genetically based contraceptive.

Nature Highlights: Air Potato Vine By: Erin Richardson

Continuing the invasive species theme, the Air Potato (*Dioscorea bulbifera*) is a perennial vine native to Asia and Africa that has been spreading through the warm climates of Southeast Louisiana. Rapid springtime growth propels these vines vertical; choking out other vegetation, competing for light and sometimes causing structural damage. As we welcome the new year, some people may commit to resolutions. Some have to do with wellbeing or reading more books, but what would a Master Naturalist's Resolutions be? We've compiled a list of resolutions to get you started, as well as some pro tips and life hacks to help you follow through and achieve your goals!

2019 Master Naturalist Resolutions

- Learn the scientific names of species
- □ Keep & maintain a nature journal
- Spend at least 10 minutes a day observing nature
- Complete a backyard bird count
- Be more active in the environmental community

Tips to achieve your resolutions!

- ★ Start small! Creating small goals that are easily achieved are a great building block to long term goals. Consider adding a new resolution each month instead of trying to do several all at once.
- ★ Be specific! When you create a goal make sure you break down the specific steps you'll take to reach that goal. For example, instead of just saying you'll learn the scientific names of species, set a more specific goal to practice one new scientific name a day. This will help ensure follow through of those resolutions and challenge yourself more.
- ★ Get support! Reach out to your fellow naturalists. Consider starting a group and commit to meeting once a month. Not only will you network with the organization, but it can help hold you accountable.
- ★ Reward yourself! Have you been eyeing a new field guide or birding scope? Treat yourself to a reward when you've completed one of your goals. You deserve it!
- ★ Enjoy it! Resolutions are about reflection and improvement, not stress.
